拿拿拿 SENIOR HISTORY



This class, though, was quickly organized, electing Barbara Ennis as President, Betty Banks as Vice-president, Elsie Wheatcroft as secretary, Max Bader as Treasurer and Aileen Boyle and Arthur Koerber as their Student Council representatives. 'Miss Kellogg and Miss Reinert were chosen as sponsors.

The next year, 93 sophomores reported for classes, now wise in the ways of high school life and able to smile down at a new crop of freshmen. This year they elected Margie Gory President, Loretta Cornelius Vice President, Larry Barrett Secretary and Treasurer and kept Miss Kellogg as their sponsor for another year.

Now upperclassmen, the juniors, 98 strong,
