

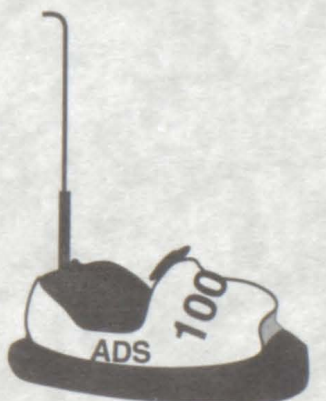

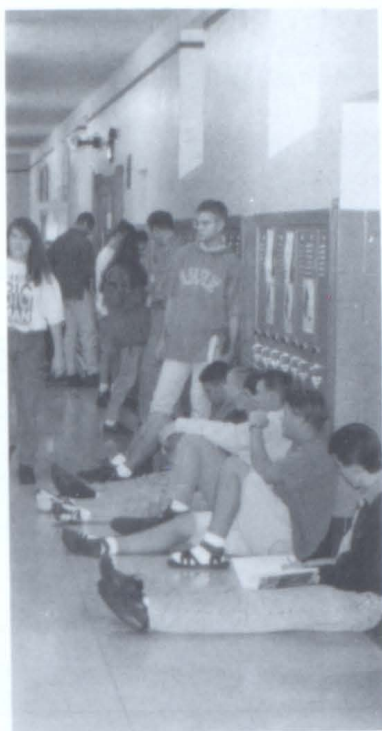
HOLD ON to the IMAGE

Freshmen comment on controversy

On June 12 between 11-12:00 p.m. Nicole Brown Simpson and her "friend," Ron Goldman were brutally murdered. Orenthal James Simpson, otherwise known as O.J. Simpson, former husband, was taken into custody.

The great scandal causing debate over O.J.'s so called jealousy has largely affected our TV and newspapers. Is O.J. Simpson guilty? Out of the 68 freshmen, 64 were present for the survey: 10 said that they didn't know; 33 said that he is innocent; 23 said that he is guilty. Still, the major question is "Will we ever know the absolute truth?"

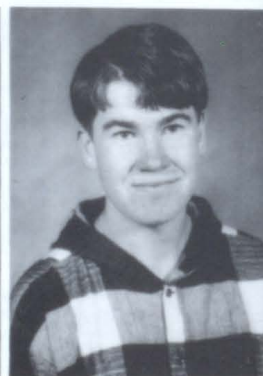

The sophomore year means that it's time to start ordering class rings. After purchasing one, the popular tradition for class rings is to trade with a boyfriend or girlfriend.

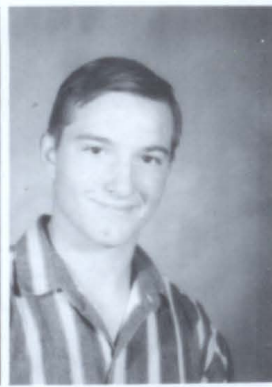

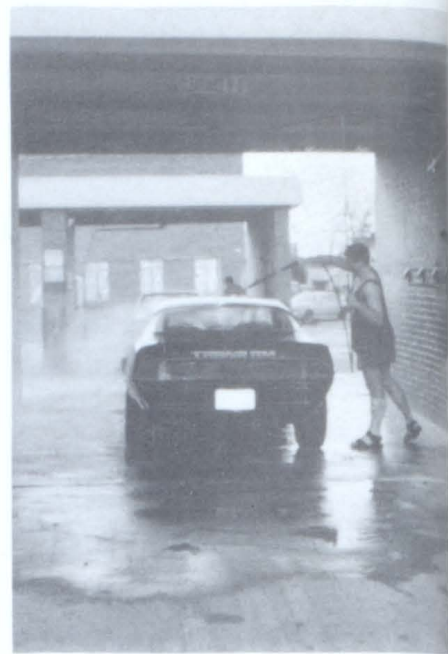

If they have a masters degree they must get six hours and if they have a bachelors degree they must get eight hours of classes. Another type of degree is a doctorate which is the next level after the masters degree. Twenty-eight of our teachers have a bachelors degree; fifty percent of these teachers have masters degree and one has a doctorates.

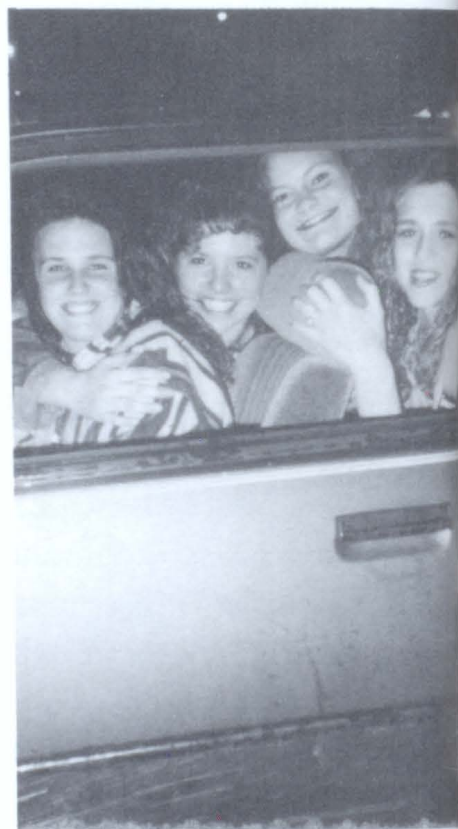

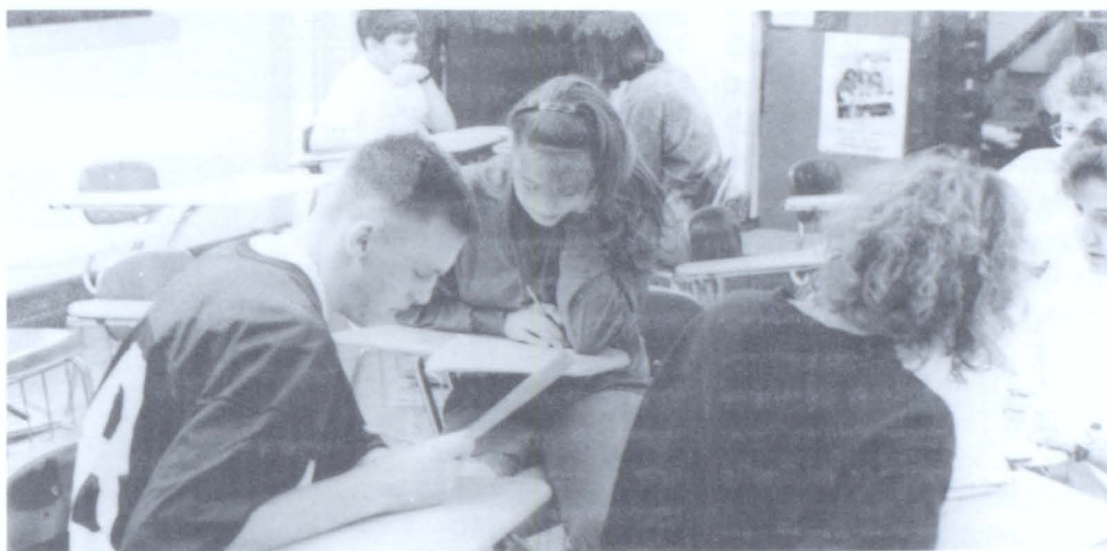
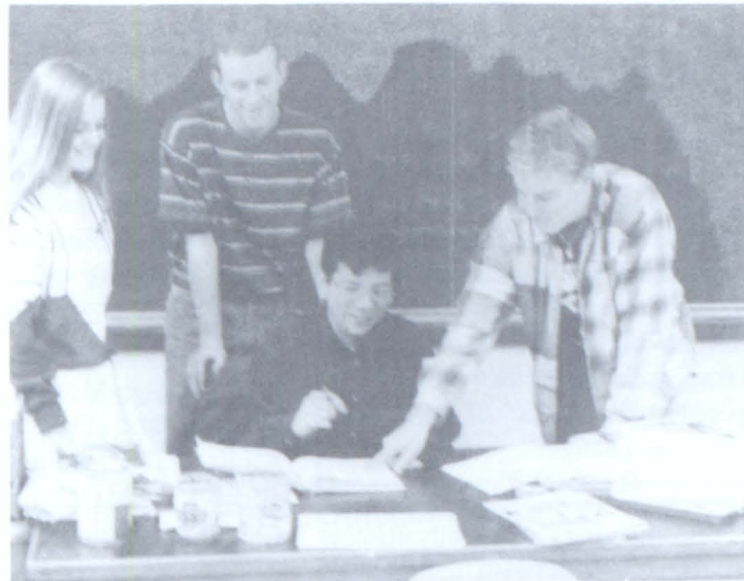
HOLD ON to the KNOWLEDGE

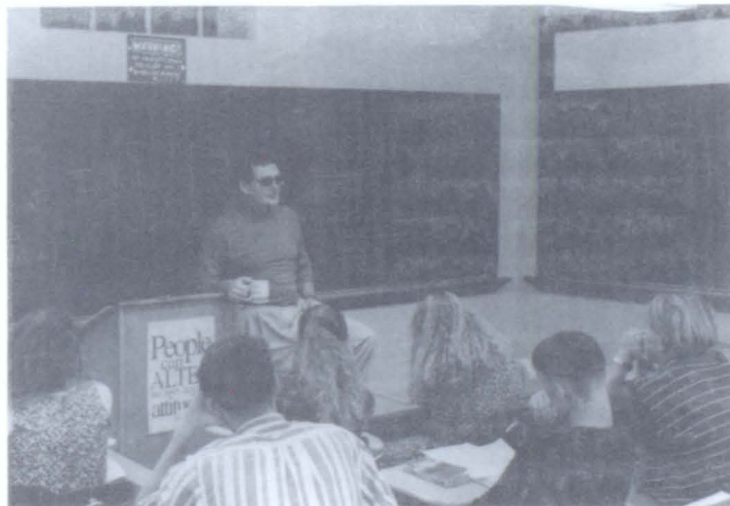

They traveled to twenty tournaments in a five month span and received first place honors at five tournaments. First place sweepstakes were acquired at four tournaments.

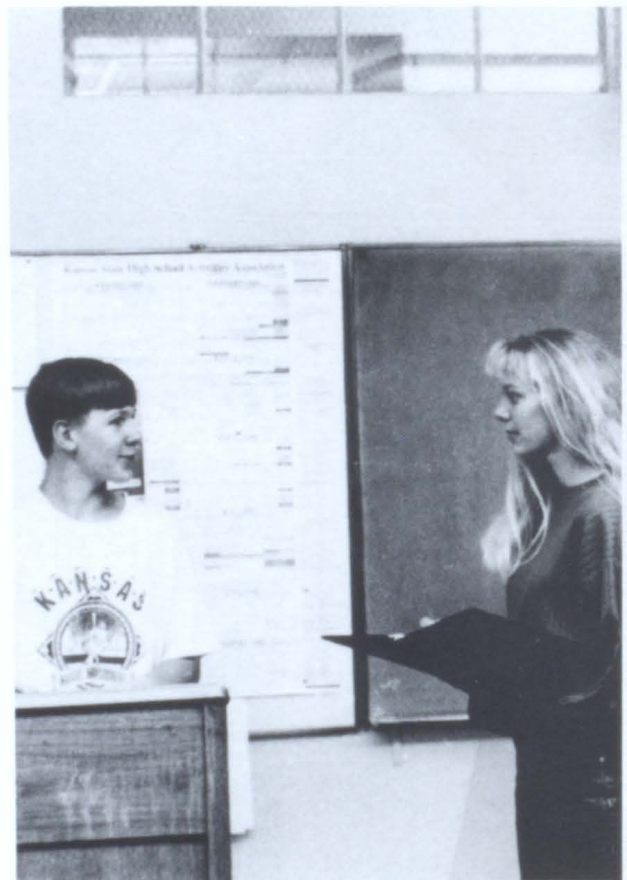

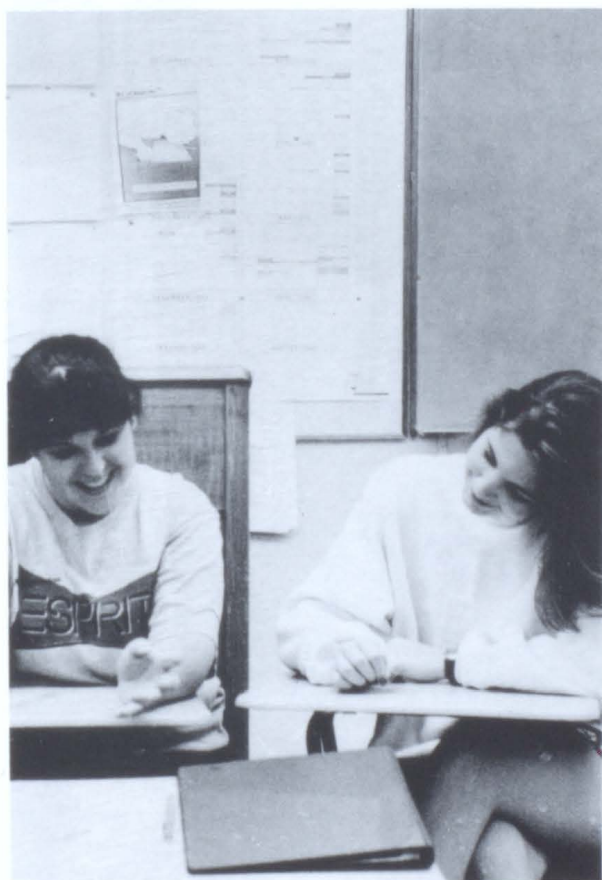

Sometimes we also have a pizza day. But most of the time, we just "slave" away, doing our work.

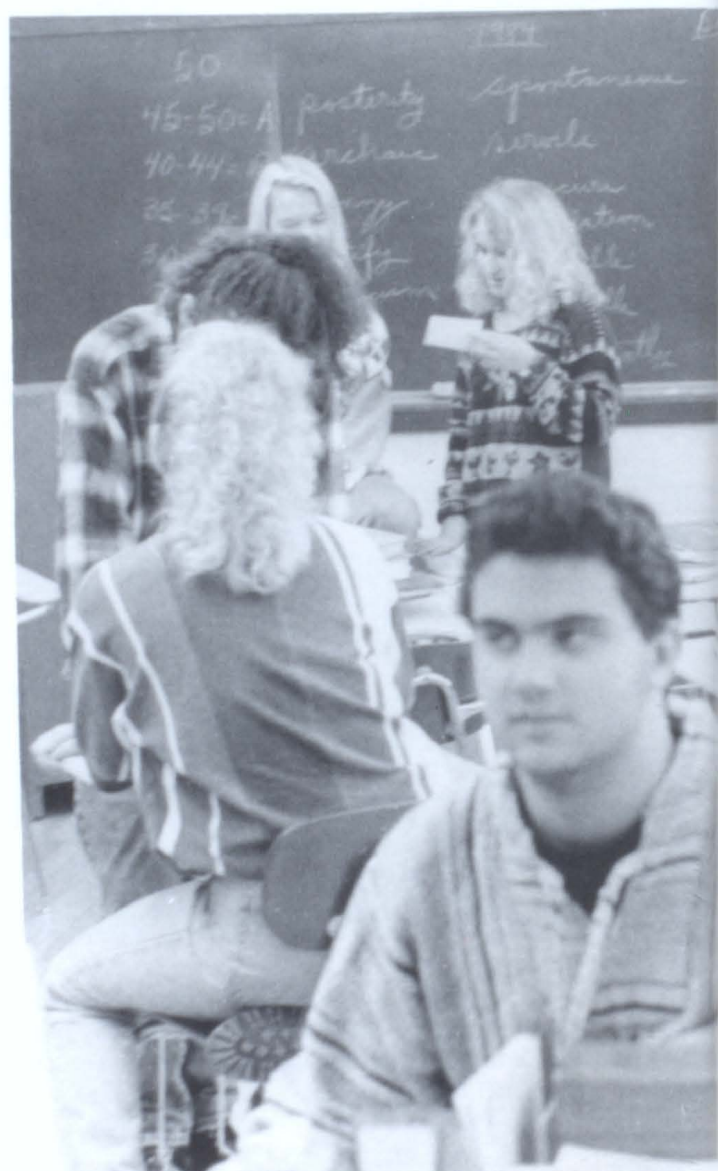
In the end it's worth it to see our finished newspapers and our biggest project, the finished yearbook.

Another thing that they do is put a picture of the dead person in a corner of their living room. They decorate the picture with flowers and some of the dead person's favorite things.

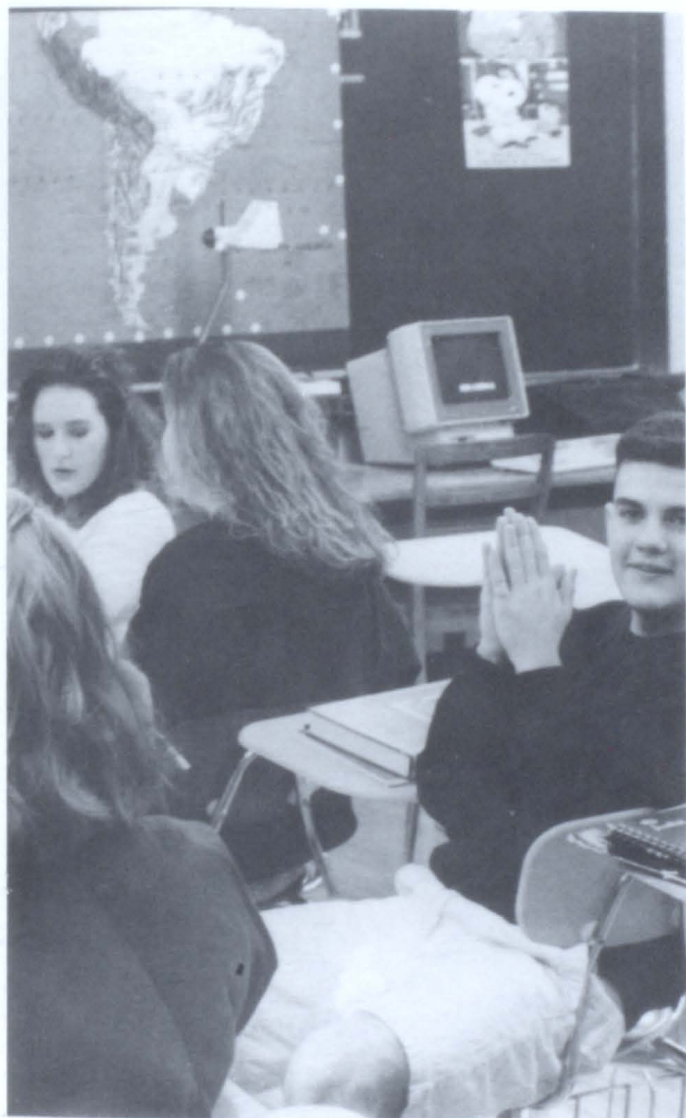
These are a few of the ways in which the Mexican people celebrate the Day of the Dead.

literature and its authors.

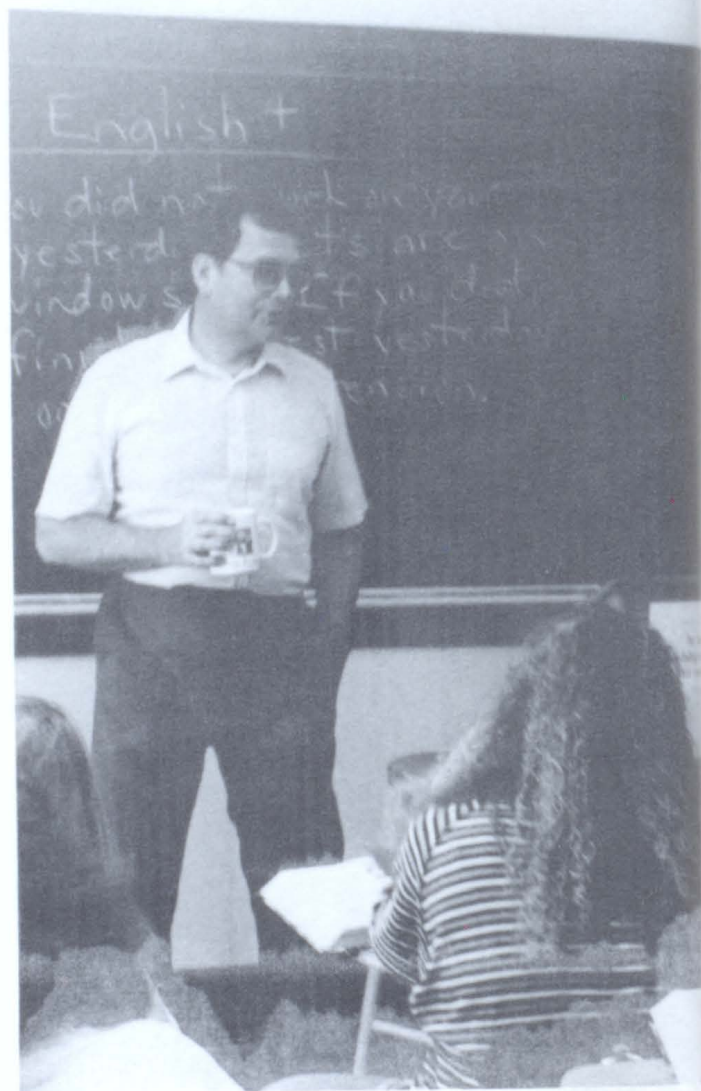
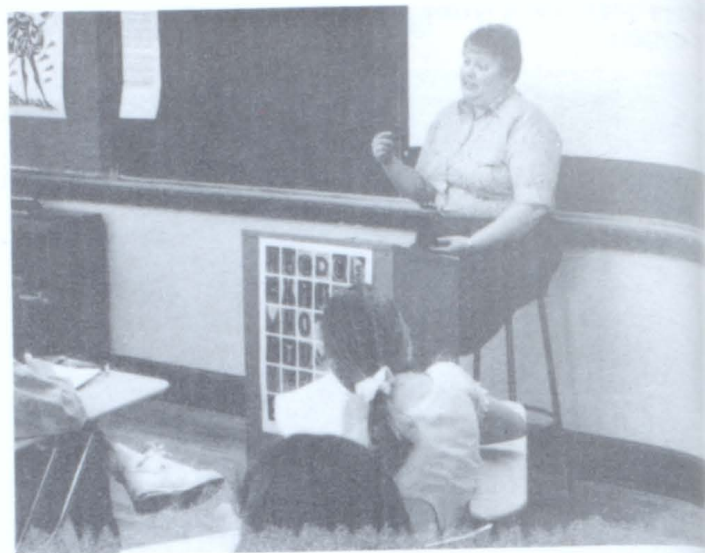
English IV is also taught by Greg Welch. This class is for college bound seniors.

Three required classes are: US government taught by Ron Reed which counts for one credit, history which also counts one credit, and

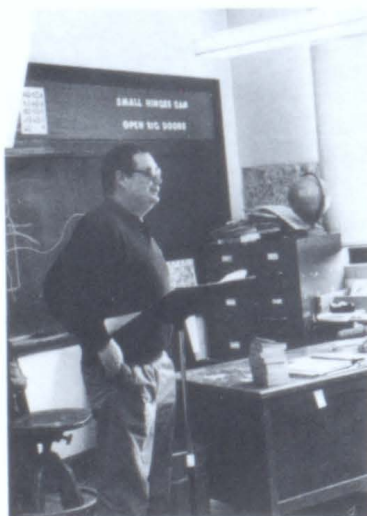
Kansas history worth half a credit. Both are taught by John Francis.

Drivers education, taught by Bruce Cooper, is counted as a social science but does not provide a credit required to graduate.

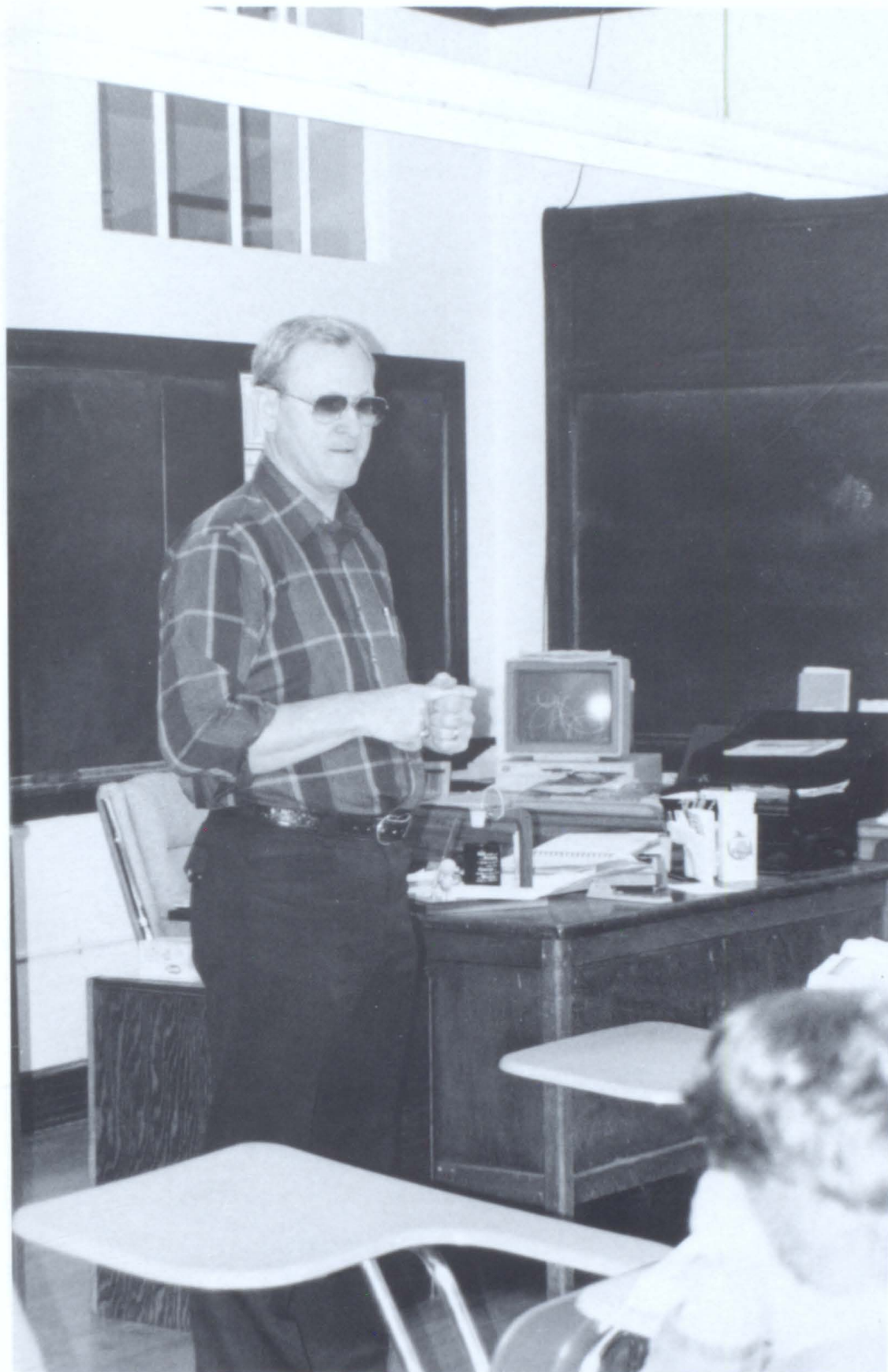

Some people may say that dissecting is "gross" or not fair for the specimen being dissected, but in Alex Specht's Biology II class, most of the students enjoy dissecting.

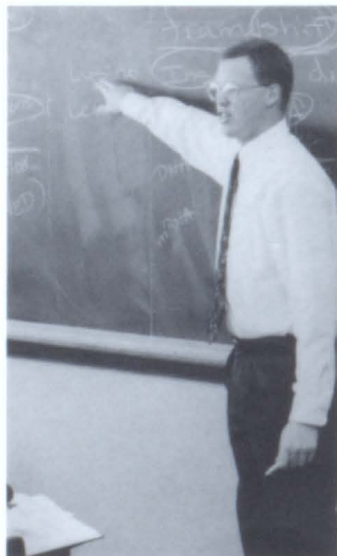
Specht's classes dissect because it provides an opportunity for students to learn in a real situation. The students actually get to put their hands on the specimens and manipulate them.

When asked what he hoped to accomplish by dissecting, Specht replied, "I hope to generate an interest in biological science by using 'hands on' procedures instead of the students relying on a book to gain all their knowledge."

When choosing a specimen, Specht looks for whether the specimen is large enough to see all the muscles and organs, that the specimen is mature and fully developed, and that it has good availability to him in a price range close to his budget.

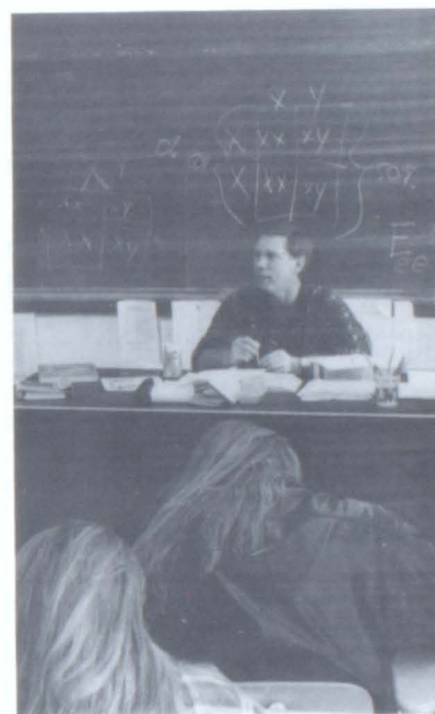
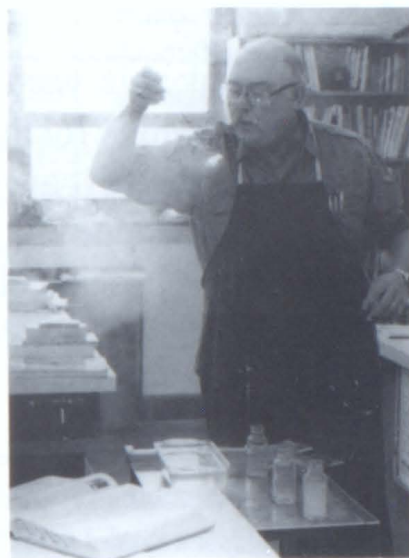

There were six different events and medals that were given to the top six individuals. Hoisington did not receive any.

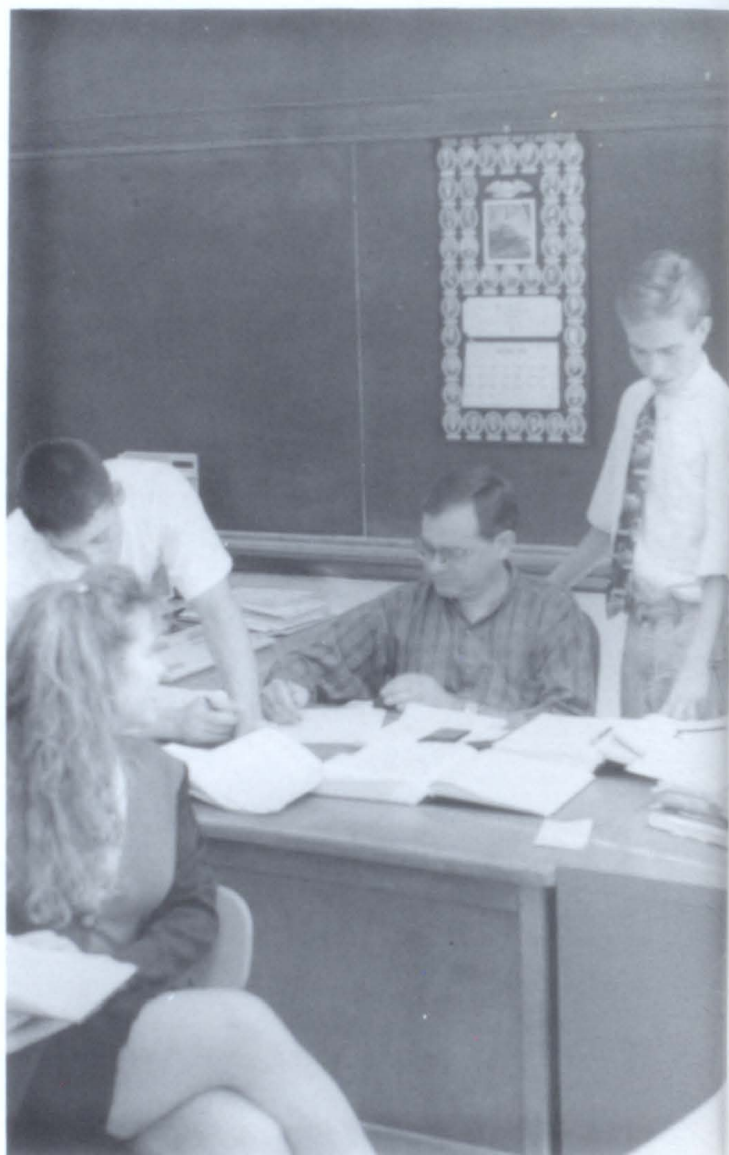

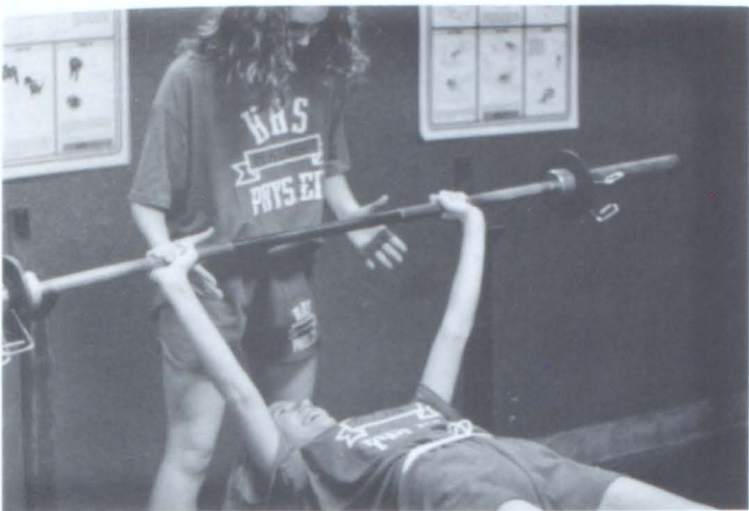

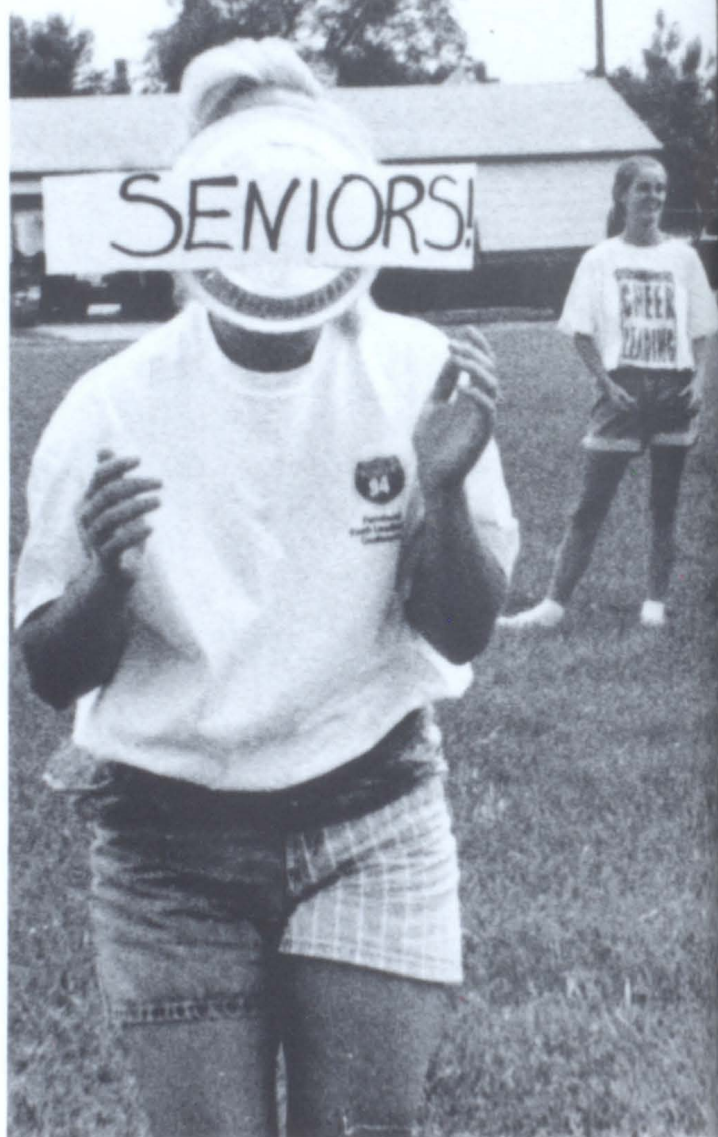

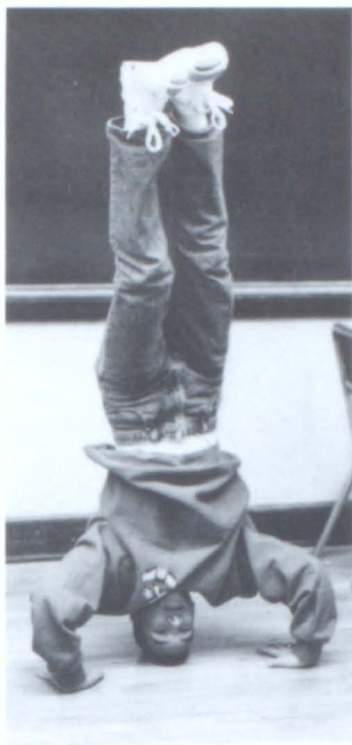
The magic of activities is what makes school life even more enjoyable after the academics. They are a valuable part of a student's extra time when not participating in school events.

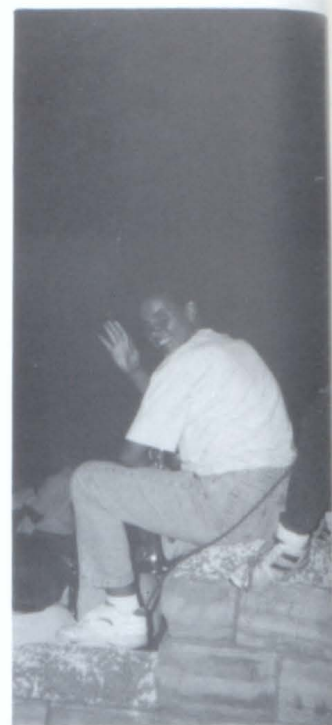

The STUCO officers were pres. Joel Welch; v. pres. Sarah Carney; pres. elect Lori Bogner; and sec./treas. Joshua Welch.

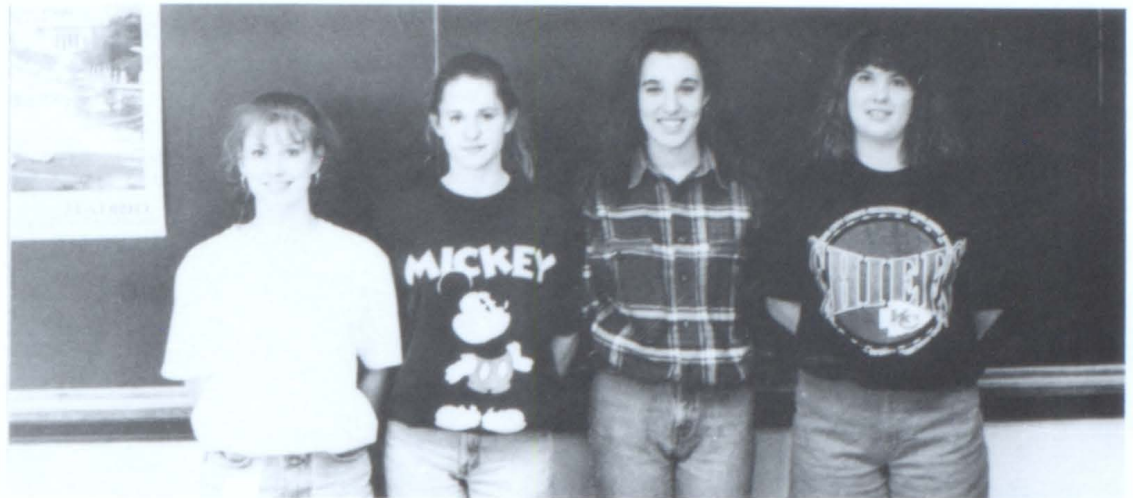

On March 11, 1995, the Fourth Annual Power Lifting Championships were held at Hoisington High School in the gymnasium.

There were 355 medals issued to 209 competitors, 27 of them were Hoisington High students, 23 were male and 4 female. The men's team led Hoisington to a first place finish in the 3A-4A Division for the fourth year in a row and the women's team captured a second place finish.

Listed below are the competitors from Hoisington that placed in the top three in the their weight class.

123 lb division-Eric Peterson first place, Joshua Welch second place; 140 lb division-Josh Klenda second place, Michael Madden third place; 148 lb division David Klima first place, Andy Steinert second place, Mike Steinert third place; 156 lb division Michael Frayser first place, Wyatt Brewer second place, Tim Urban third place; 165 lb division Noble Duncan first place; 181 lb division Brian Yanda first place; 220 lb division-Charlie Martin third place.

Women's Powerweight division-Mandy Schneider second place, and Krystal Wrench third place.

All women compete in one division. The champion for each lift competition is determined by the "Swartz Formula" which considers the ratio of the lifter's body weight to the amount lifted.

This year, 10 lifters went on to the State Powerlifting meet. They were Josh Welch, Eric Peterson, Andy Steinert, Mike Steinert, Michael Frayser, Noble Duncan, Chad Shook, Brian Yanda, Charlie Martin, and Nick Windsor.

Brian Yanda won the state championship in the 181 lb. weight class and set a new state clean record with a lift of 335 lbs. Brian has now claimed state victories in both class 3A and 4A, and Eric Peterson also set a state clean record in the 132 lb.class.

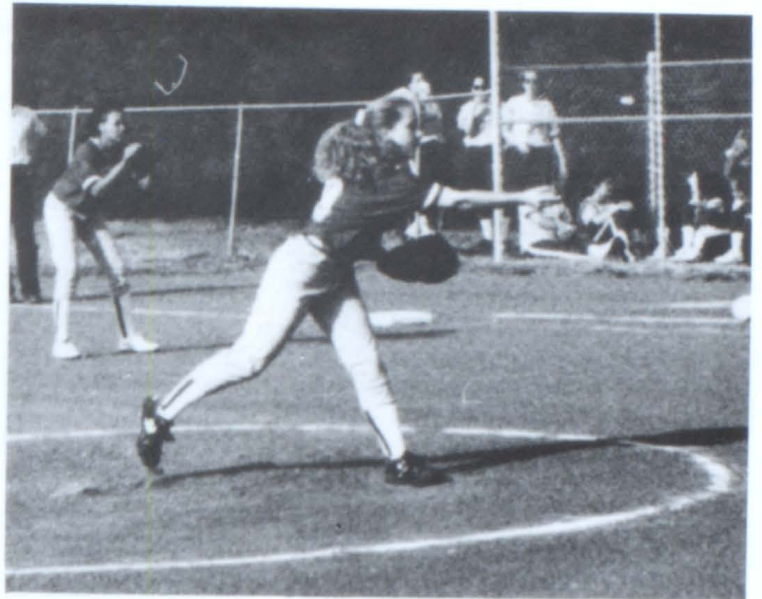

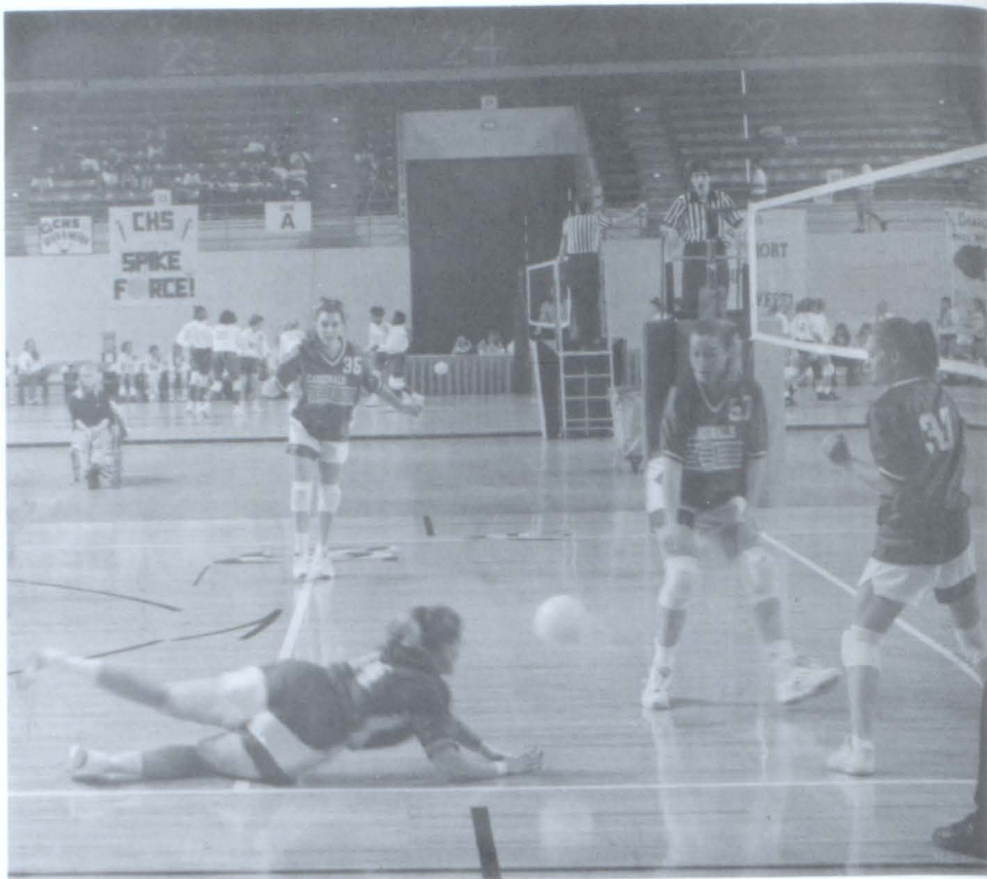

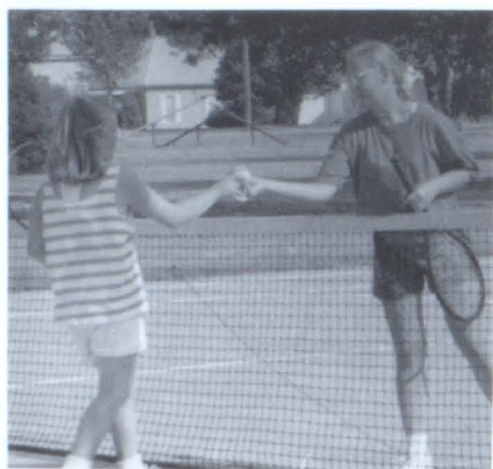

For the first time ever the state

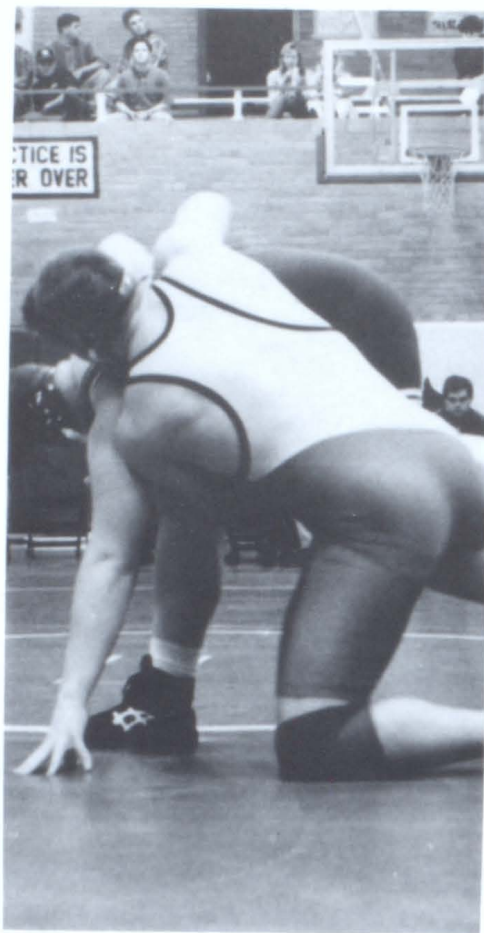

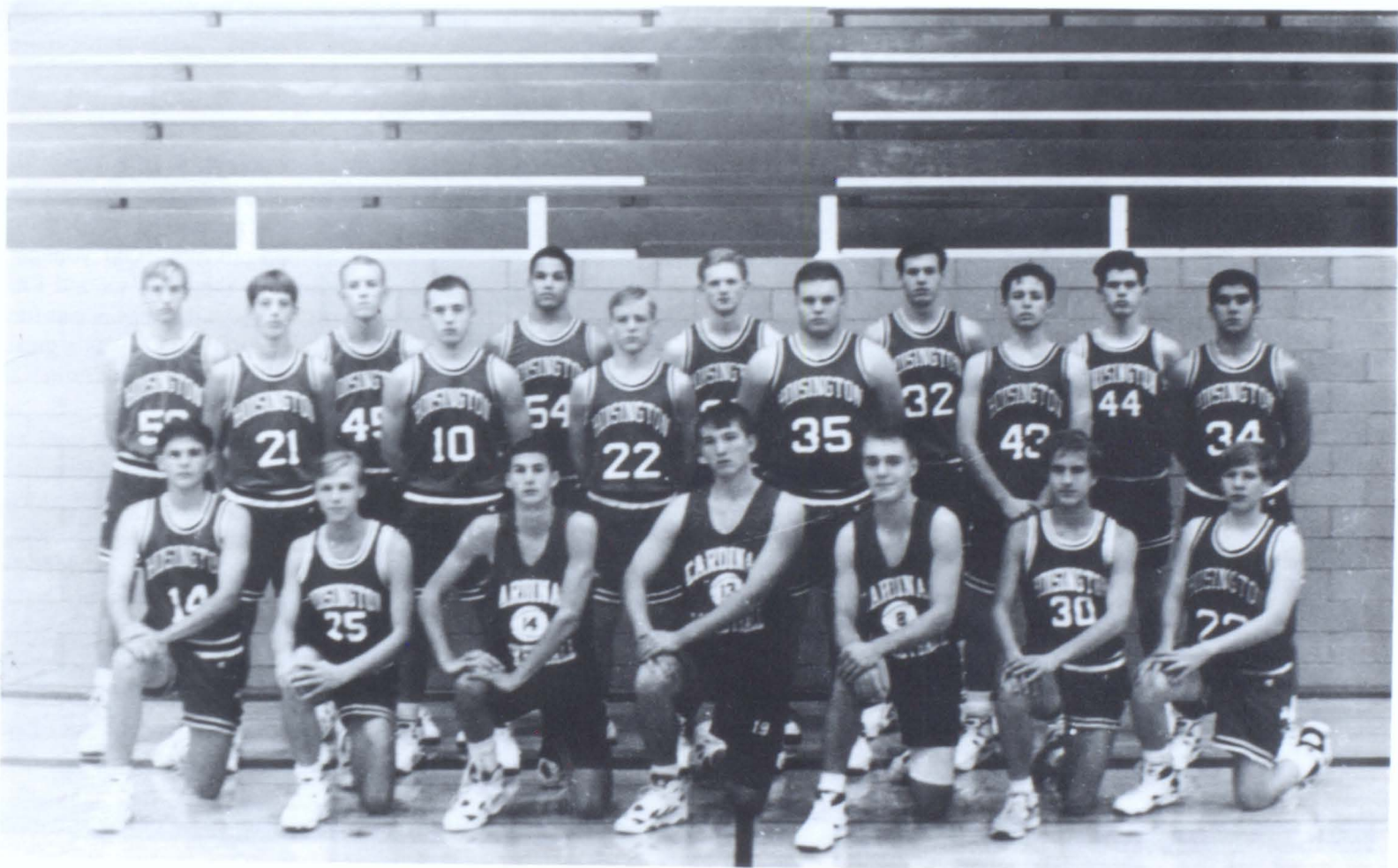

team to State competition since he had been here in Hoisington, Cooper replied, "Ten years, every year, but 1986 and 1988 since 1984."

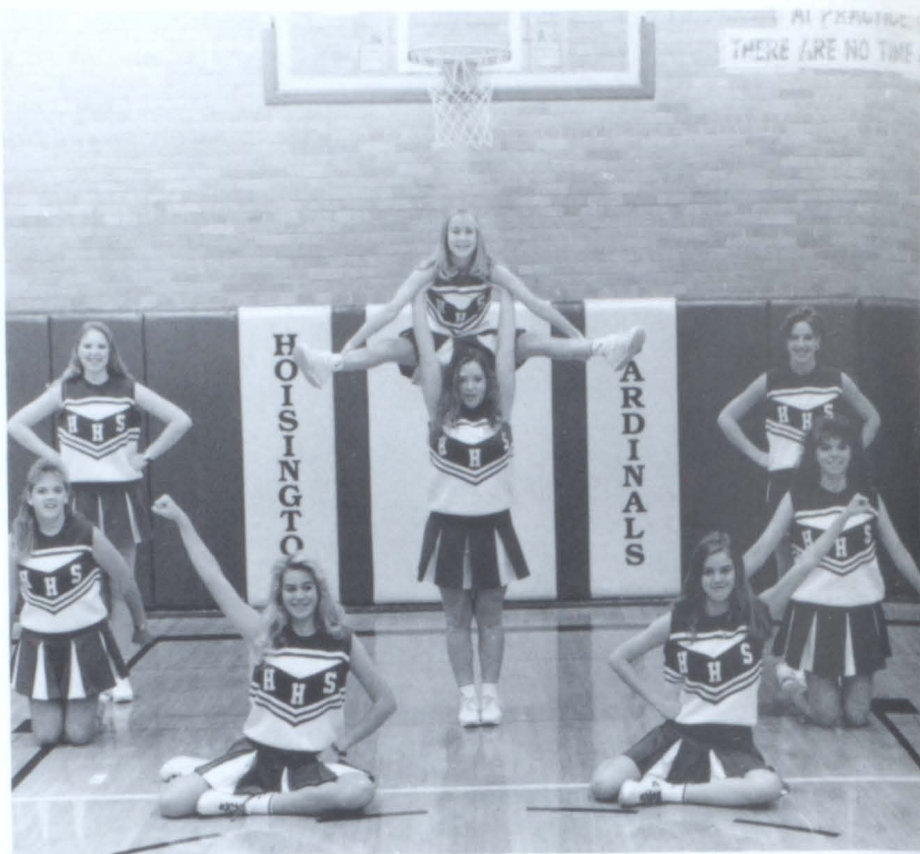

Cheerleaders do other activities like making post-

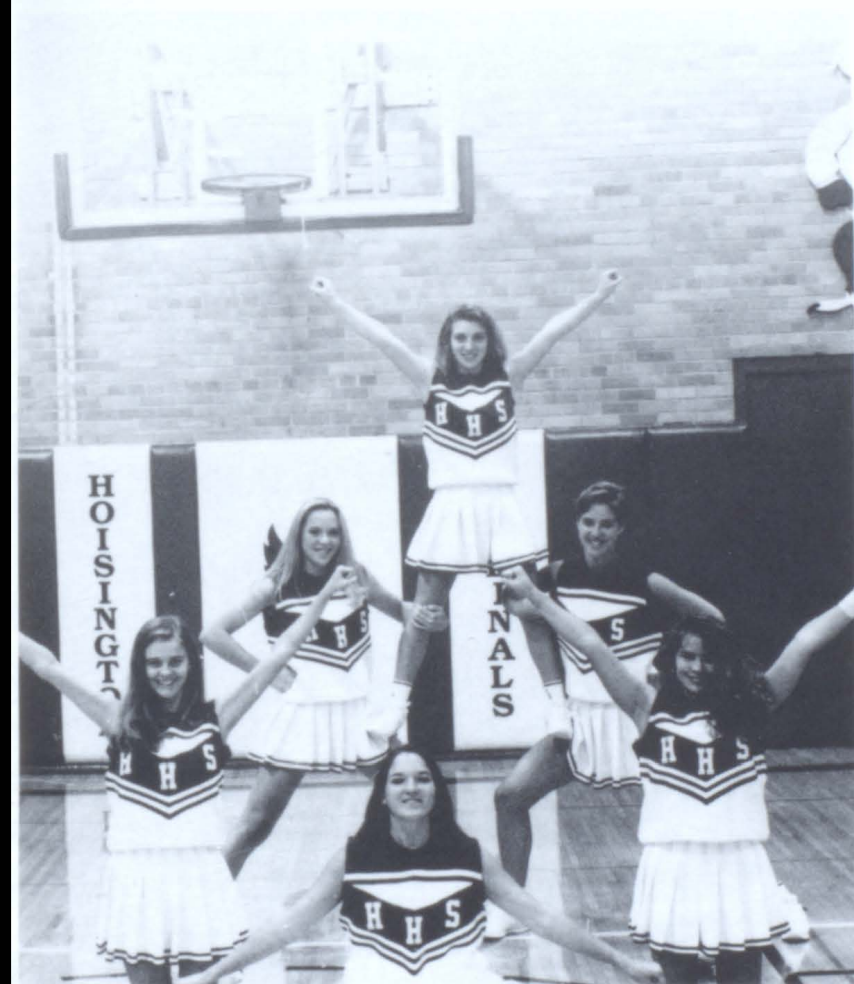

The body type was Times-Roman, 10 point. Cutlines were Times-Roman, 9 point. The pages were designed using the computer program Aldus PageMaker 4.0.

The cover was designed by the yearbook staff and produced by Jostens. The book was bound in Smoke 491. The grain was Brushstroke, with black print 326, and red foil 384.

The endsheets were smoke gray 297 with black 395.

The book contains 148 pages with 8 color pages used for the senior pictures. Photographs were taken, developed, and printed by the staff photographers. Approximately 1,100 feet of film was used throughout the year. The senior pictures were provided by area photographers and Riggs Studio and Camera Shop provided the individual pictures of the underclassmen and faculty.

The theme "Hold on for the Ride" was selected for the yearbook because the staff felt that life is quite the ride.

Besides producing the 1995 Cardinal Corridors, the yearbook/newspaper staff produced 8 newspapers over the course of the 1994-1995 school year. The staff and sponsor put in a great deal of time and effort to make this yearbook and the newspapers possible.

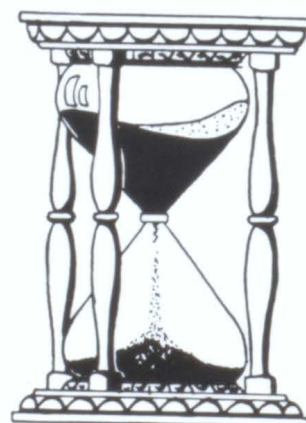
